We even managed to prioritize our meal services by putting together bagged lunches and delivering them to members across the county.



Recovery Café of Clark County (RCCC) is a non-profit organization and part of a national network of similar Cafés serving individuals who have suffered trauma, houselessness, addiction and/or other mental health challenges. In a Café setting of *Radical Hospitality* members experience belonging, healing, and the joy of contributing to a nurturing community that specifically acknowledges addiction and mental health challenges.

As a Recovery Café Network (RCN) Member, we provide a wide variety of services and resources at RCCC including free meals, peer support circles, one-on-one recovery coaching, employment services, opportunities for volunteering, access to technology, Telephone Recovery Support (TRS), connection to recovery housing, and many other resources and support.



### PEER SUPPORT CIRCLES



Every week we host several peer recovery support circles made up of about 8-10 members each. Recovery Circles provide an opportunity to build connection and maintain support. During the pandemic we made all circles hybrid allowing individuals to still receive support while attending via zoom.







## ONE-ON-ONE RECOVERY COACHING

Through a person-centered system of care, the Recovery Coach program utilizes seasoned recovery coaches to support individuals with achieving their goals and reaching long-term recovery. The Recovery Coach program continues to grow both in staff and members. It is worth noting that some recovery coaches are peers and have been in recovery themselves allowing them the strength of lived experience and deep connection with recoverees.

In December of 2020 we started the one-on-one Recovery Coach program with two recovery coaches. The first month we gained seven Recovery Café members for coaching services. From there, we continued to grow from month-to-month.

By October 1st, 2021, the Recovery Coach Program moved into its own building allowing five recovery coaches the ability to open services to the recovery community in Clark County.

By October 31st, 2021, we gained forty new recoverees from the community.

# FOUNDATIONAL COMMUNITY SUPPORTS

In 2021, our organization became approved by Washington State to provide Foundational Community Supports through both employment services and most recently housing services.

The Cafe's supported employment services have assisted individuals with filling out job applications, pre-interview and pre-hire test preparation, becoming employed, outreach and communication with employers, and maintaining employment through on-the-job support, education, training, and coaching.

RCCC housing services have been able to provide individuals with finding permanent places to live, maintain their housing. and integration into the community through transitional housing. Support also can include connecting individuals to other local services that will help with their housing needs.

# RECOVERY NAVIGATOR PROGRAM (RNP)

Growth has become a reputation of ours this year. The creation and implementation of the Recovery Navigator Program (RNP) was a huge part of that growth.



Our Recovery Navigator Program provides one-on-one recovery support to individuals that come to the attention of frontline crisis workers including law enforcement, medical professionals, and child welfare staff. Our goal is to intervene with expedited access into the substance use recovery system.



We continue to partner with our local law enforcement on connecting with individuals who could benefit from our support with the RNP.

### TELEPHONE RECOVERY SUPPORT (TRS)

Our TRS program was also developed with the intent to connect to our members who had disengaged and offer recovery support to them by phone. The program has been a huge success and although our main goal is not to ask members to come back to the Café directly, we saw a number of members back through our doors and nurturing their recovery. The TRS program has also recently partnered with our RNP program to assure that we are always available with immediate response to the community.





# SCHOOL FOR RECOVERY

As a community organization, we strive to create comfortable spaces where members and non-members have the ability to grow and develop skills that are personally meaningful to them.

We offered several classes to the community in 2021 including:

- Art
- Yoga
- Sound Healing
- Meditation
- Writing
- Book Club
- Walking Groups

Classes are designed to build connection, provide healing and positivity, and allow members and non-members to grow and develop their recovery journey through learning new skills and experiences. Some other classes RCCC has offered include Wellness Recovery Action Planning (WRAP); various anonymous groups; men and women's groups; parenting classes; and Recovery Coach Academy where individuals can be trained in Peer Recovery Coaching and enrich their own recovery in the process.

## COMMUNITY OUTREACH & VOLUNTEERING

Our efforts to continuously build connection within the walls of the Café and out in the community have never been more important, We have been focused on reaching treatment centers, detox, and the therapeutic courts to share a message of hope and connection that can truly be found at the Café. Providing information, resources, and tools allows individuals in treatment a chance to begin building a strong foundation of recovery and prepare for when they complete their treatment.

#### **VOLUNTEER PROGRAM**

Our volunteer program has grown immensely throughout the 2021 and allows volunteers the opportunity to develop their job skills while also giving back to the community and supporting the Café mission. Our organization has also now become an option for community service hours preapproved by a Clark County judge, opening up the possibility for drug court participants to connect with the Café.



The monthly Thrive2Survive drives provide the houseless community with hot food, resources, daily living essentials and most importantly, connection. Other services that have been provided include access to free dental care and veterinarian care. We hope to continue our collaboration with community partners to bring more on demand resources to the community each year.






#### FINANCIAL REPORT

As an organization we ended 2020 with a total of 12 employees and within a year increased to 34. In order to meet the growth 2021 brought RCCC, we increased our expenses and rented an additional building next door. During 2021, we were also able to offer staff medical and dental benefits. Included in our grant revenue of 2021 are the COVID-19 related grants that supported our organization immensely.


#### Revenue 2020

Total Revenue: \$842,672




#### Revenue 2021

Total Revenue: 787,500




#### Expenses 2020
